- Assist teachers and administrators in examining relevant data to monitor student progress and make instructional decisions to meet the needs of all learners.
- Develop and maintain accurate and timely records.
- Collaboratively facilitate and participate in parent/community meetings, Board meetings and school meetings, and make presentations as appropriate.
- Support professional learning for teachers and administrators. Conduct needs assessments, develop and facilitate professional learning, and evaluate the impact of professional learning on instructional practices and student learning.
- Attend professional learning and networking meetings at school, district, county, and state levels.
- Collaborate with teachers and administrators to develop, curate, and evaluate instructional materials and supporting resources. Develop related training materials to support utilization of materials and resources to support demonstration of student learning.
- Participate and contribute as an active member of the Instructional Services team.
- Engage in self-directed professional learning opportunities to stay current on research-based best practices for teaching and learning and maintaining students' social-emotional wellness.
- · Work collaboratively and independently on projects and tasks.
