Solana Santa Fe Students Focus on Making A Difference and Being Kind

They solicited donations from families throughout the school community. This included soups, sauces, mashed potatoes, and more. Recently, Solana Santa Fe's older students have engaged in meaningful activities to promote kindness within our school community. The Great Kindness Challenge is a nationwide, week-long demonstration of the power of being kind, and our sixth grade students took the lead by supporting their classmates in being kind to one another. During recess, our sixth graders set up "Kindness Stations." All students were encouraged to come by the stations and participate in activities that ranged from writing kind letters to community members to creating bookmarks for friends.

The older students provided guidance to their younger peers throughout the week, offering materials, ideas, and smiles so that all of our students could feel empowered to create something that would make someone else feel good.
