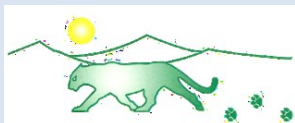

All students, including English Learners, are given their own individual standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects for use in the classroom and to take home. All materials are available for parent examination at the school site or district office.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

Carmel Creek School provides a safe, clean environment for students, staff, and volunteers. Carmel Creek School was built in 1994 and a 12-classroom addition was completed in 1998. The school buildings span 58,810 square feet, consisting of 33 permanent classrooms, one portable classroom, a library, a staff room, a multi-purpose room, a computer lab, and a playground. The facility strongly supports teaching and learning through its classroom and playground space. The chart shows the results of the most recent school facilities inspection.

School Safety Plan

Student safety and campus security during the school day are of primary importance. All gates are kept locked during the school day, and all visitors must sign-in at the school's office and wear an identification badge while on school grounds. Surveillance cameras, which are not actively monitored, are installed in each ingress and egress area. Teachers, instructional aides, and administrators provide supervision before and after school, during lunch and during recess periods. Development of the Comprehensive Safe School Plan is a collaborative effort between school and district to comply with Senate Bill 187 (SB 187) of 1997. The plan provides students and staff a means of ensuring a safe and orderly learning environment.

Each school includes the following requirements of SB 187 within their safe school plans: current status of school crime; child abuse reporting procedures; disaster procedures, routine and emergency; policies related to suspension and expulsion; notification to teachers; sexual harassment policy; provision of a school-wide dress code; safe ingress and egress of pupils, parents, and school employees; safe and orderly school environment; and school rules and procedures. The school evaluates the plan annually and updates it as needed. The plan was last updated and reviewed with school staff in September 2017.
