Skyline School, grades 4-6, has been relocated to a temporary campus that is located on the south end of the Earl Warren Middle School campus in the San Dieguito Union High School District as Skyline is being rebuilt over the 2017-18 school year. The temporary facilities include 15 classrooms. The Global Education Program (eight classrooms with students in grades K-6) has been temporarily moved to Solana Highlands Elementary School in Carmel Valley for the 2017-18 school year.

The Skyline campus is completely fenced in and gates are locked during school hours. Parents/guests must announce that they would like to enter the campus by pressing a buzzer at the front gate. Once admitted, they must come into the front office to sign in and get a visitor's badge before going out on campus.

#### **School Safety Plan**

Student safety and campus security during the school day are of primary importance. All gates are kept locked during the school day, and all visitors must sign-in at the school's office and wear an identification badge while on school grounds. Surveillance cameras, which are not actively monitored, are installed in each ingress and egress area. Teachers, instructional aides, and administrators provide supervision before and after school, during lunch and during recess periods. Development of the Comprehensive Safe School Plan is a collaborative effort between school and district to comply with Senate Bill 187 (SB 187) of 1997. The plan provides students and staff a means of ensuring a safe and orderly learning environment.

Each school includes the following requirements of SB 187 within their safe school plans: current status of school crime; child abuse reporting procedures; disaster procedures, routine and emergency; policies related to suspension and expulsion; notification to teachers; sexual harassment policy; provision of a school-wide dress code; safe ingress and egress of pupils, parents, and school employees; safe and orderly school environment; and school rules and procedures. The school evaluates the plan annually and updates it as needed. The plan was last updated and reviewed with school staff in September 2017.
